Presidents Corner

Greetings and welcome to summer, or the continuation of winter, depending upon where you live. The WACE Spring conference, held at Snoqualmie Pass, was well attended. The topic was Oxford House, the non-profit organization that helps recovering addicts on their way back into society. Many jurisdictions have these facilities, you may not even be aware they are in your community. Kirkland is about to annex seven of them. This is the group that took Edmonds to the U.S. Supreme Court and led to the enforcement of the Federal Fair Housing Act on this type of facility. The presentation was one of the first by the presenters and will be more polished in the future, however, the information presented was very valuable to many of those present. Thanks to Brenda for her efforts in bringing this speaker to us. This was another idea that had been presented to the Board. The Board encourages members to make suggestions for future topics.

On the legislative front, HB1047, which adds Code Enforcement Officers as a class to be protected from assault in the line of duty along with police officers, firefighters, nurses, etc., did make it to a hearing this year, but the bill died there. We will take a new approach this next session. We are asking that each Officer present our bill to your supervisor and ask for their written support of the bill. We are hoping that the additional support from the local jurisdictions will encourage the Association of Washington Cities (AWC) to assist us with their support of the bill. If each Officer does this we will have sponsors from each district and should be able to get the bill passed this next session. In the case of Kirkland, we will have the legislative liaison helping to build support and usher the bill to the legislators that have the influence to move it in both houses. We will have more information at Fall Conference, including the bill number and a suggested letter to present to your supervisors to build support. Thanks to Chris Grabowski for your help and work on this.

Our website continues to be updated and Betty Cruz is moving forward to become our webmaster. The information on the site provides valuable contacts including the connection to NAMFS. NAMFS is a website to connect us to the property maintenance arm of the mortgage industry. You must register with the site, but the promise of getting current and quick information to help with abandoned properties is worth the effort. I have heard reports of good response from Officers that have used this service.

We have appointed a new 2nd Vice President, Liz Krzyminski (City of Bellevue), and a new Board Member, Heather Trautman (City of Spokane). We thank both for stepping up, as well as the others that have volunteered. This is a reminder that the Executive Board is up for election this Fall, and if you have been interested in helping to lead WACE here is your chance. I would encourage anyone that is interested in serving on the Board to talk with a current Board member. There is a time commitment. Be certain that you understand the responsibilities and have the support of your supervisor. Serving on the Board is a great opportunity and helps to build your resume, as well as networking. It also counts in the recertification process.

Although budgets have not improved much and times are still tough, I hope to see many of you this Fall in Leavenworth. Our training is specifically geared to Code Enforcement Officers, and even more importantly toward what our membership needs and has requested. We have some great speakers lined up and it is always a good time to network and get questions answered about what other Officers in Washington are doing as well.

There has been new information provided about "Sovereign Citizens" and the danger they present to Government, specifically to those in enforcement. AACE appears to be scheduling information on this for the fall AACE conference, but if you have any information about this please submit an article and spread the word, as well as planning to discuss in Leavenworth.

I have greatly enjoyed my time as President and appreciate the opportunity to represent the membership in a variety of settings. I plan on continuing to be active in WACE, however, I will not be running for office this year. I encourage all members to consider serving in some form to better our Association and further your own experience.

The following positions are up for election this fall:

DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT: The President shall be directly responsible for the supervision and guidance of the affairs of this association and shall preside over all meetings. The President shall enforce the By-laws of this Association and perform other duties that would be recognized as being part of the office. The headquarters of the Association shall be the Office of the President so long as it is located in the State of Washington.

DUTIES OF THE 1ST VICE-PRESIDENT: The 1st Vice-President will preside over all meetings in the absence of the President. The primary duties of the 1st Vice-President shall be to chair the Steering Committee and to assist the Treasurer in carrying out the duties of his/her office.

DUTIES OF THE 2ND VICE-PRESIDENT: The 2nd Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President and 1st Vice-President. The primary duty of the 2nd Vice-President shall be to chair the Certification Committee and to keep the President informed of the current progress and future plans of the committee.

DUTIES OF THE 3RD VICE-PRESIDENT: The 3rd Vice-President shall preside during the combined absences of the President and the 1st and 2nd Vice-Presidents. The primary responsibility of the 3rd Vice-President is to serve as the Membership Committee Chair-Person "and to maintain a roster of current members." CARNATION MAN SENTENCED FOR THREATENING TO KILL KING COUNTY CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

On February 3, 2010, Code Enforcement Officer Brenda Wood went to the Dale Davis property on Tolt River Road, to post a King County legal document that was not accepted at Mr. Davis' post office box. Officer Wood went to the edge of the property and posted the document on a tree, where Mr. Davis approached her. Angry in regards to the action being taken by King County, he called her obscene names. He then proceeded to tell her that he and some friends were meeting at the coffee shop and were planning to harm or kill her to stop her from working. As protocol required, Officer Wood reported the incident to King County Sheriffs Office, called her supervisor, an officer to file a report and was interviewed by a King County Deputy. Davis admitted to calling her names and threatening her. He was arrested on Felony harassment.

That weekend a woman called roads emergency and Seattle Arson Unit, stating that she had been included in text messages between several men, and she was trying to alert someone who could reach Officer Wood that these men were going to burn down her house and kill her dog.

February 13, 2010, Officer Wood, her husband and dog, Annie, went to visit her children's new home in Cle Elum. The home has land and Annie loved to play with the family pets. She never left Officer Woods' side on normal days. When Annie could not be found, the Cle Elum Police were called. Officer Wood returned to the Cle Elum home only to find a blood trail where Annie had drug herself back. She had been shot with a single bullet. She was rushed to the animal hospital where she later died. During the following weeks Officer Wood was told that Davis allegedly bragged that he followed Officer Wood to her house and shot her dog.

For years, Davis has had a reign of terror over the neighborhood, with threats, and bullying. He built an illegal shack, no permits, no legal septic, bootlegged into the community well by trespassing onto a neighboring property, causing health issues. (King County had a Superior Court order directing Davis to tear down the structure, remove the junk and debris, vehicles, etc. which Davis had ignored.) He had crushed cars, dumped oil, graded steep slopes endangering homes below. The community felt they were held hostage by his threats.

Davis pled guilty to charges of threatening Officer Wood. He was expecting another slap on the hands and probation. Officer Wood, Davis' wife and a neighbor all provided testimony. People and family who had been affected by Mr. Davis' actions were in the Court room. Judge Shafer read numerous letters sent to the Court and attorneys for both sides. On Friday, July 8, 2011, Davis was sentenced to a year in County jail, minus six days served.

A King County Deputy, with a new arrest warrant for Davis, was waiting for court to adjourn. Mr. Davis was to be arrested for threatening and harassment of a neighbor. Davis had violated a "no contact" order on the 4th of July by allegedly shooting bottle rockets at the neighbor's family cars as they drove up to the house and at his home. However, Judge Shafer ordered Davis arrested immediately, in the court room, and taken to King County Jail for the threats to Officer Wood. She told the King County Detective he could wait and arrest Davis later after his release from jail.

It took a wise judge, who looked at the entire picture, and recognized it for what it was. It took an officer being terrorized to the point she would not attend family functions such as ball

games, parties, special events, because she was afraid of being followed to her family's home. The officer continued to stand with the community she represented, worked with the King County Police Detectives on the community neighborhood directed patrol plan and knew the officers had her back. Diligent paper work and team work involving the Sheriffs Office and Code Enforcement is evidence that the directed patrol worked.

Kittitas County Prosecuting Attorney and the Cle Elum police have requested copies of the paper work, testimony, and records to proceed with an investigation of Annie's shooting. Cle Elum has the bullet and the necropsy provided by the veterinarian.

The Washington Association of Code Enforcement has been lobbying to get a bill passed in Olympia which recognizes attacks on Code Enforcement personnel equal to Animal Control personnel and Forest Rangers. Although we have had some support, we have been unable to get the policy changed in Olympia to provide a sentence worthy of a public servant. We will, for the fifth year, try to get HB1047 (which adds Code Enforcement Officers as a class protected from assault) passed. No officer's family should ever have to go through this terror. WE MUST JOIN TOGETHER AND FIGHT FOR THIS BILL

Proposed New Law for Abatement of Nuisance Conditions

The City of Spokane Neighborhood and Code Enforcement staff are proposing to the WACE members that this organization and the jurisdictions that you represent support a bill that would allow abatements of outdoor nuisance conditions, specifically solid waste. Under the proposed bill, violations would include accumulations of garbage, debris, refuse and other discarded material present on private property. The proposed amendments to the RCW would be focused specifically on the exterior of property (yards & open space) and for properties in private residential settings. These types of regulations would not be as intrusive as the current laws regarding inspections of businesses which are permitted under the Fire and Building Codes (International Code Council). These types of nuisance violations/conditions would be civil in nature and would do not raise to the level of being as a criminal violation.

Cities and counties within Washington State are not permitted to conduct an investigation or abate private property determined to be a public nuisance without an administrative warrant (RCW 7.48) Administrative warrants are not available to Municipal Courts based on a landmark case - *City of Seattle v. McCready* (1994), in which the Washington Supreme Court determined that an administrative warrant issued by the City of Seattle Municipal Court to the Building Department inspector was not valid as there was no statute or court ruling authorizing the court do so. The Washington State Supreme Court recently confirmed the *McCready* decision in *Bosteder v. City of Renton* that found that an administrative search warrant issued in the case to inspect an apartment for city building code violations was not valid based on the judge not having specific statutory authority to issue the administrative warrant.

Without changes to the statutes, violating conditions may not be confirmed and compliance may not be able to be achieved. This would result in deterioration of neighborhoods, increases in other types of crimes, loss of property values, loss of civic pride in neighborhoods and decline in City and County revenues from property taxes. This is an issue which affects every community in the state and nation. By the legislatures creation of specific statutory authority that grants municipalities the ability to abate nuisance conditions the law would provide municipalities a significant shield against liability for cities/counties that conduct administrative investigations and abatements of nuisance conditions.

For those who attended the Spring WACE conference, they were briefed on this proposal and copies of the draft bill were passed out. Attendees were asked to take the draft back to their respective jurisdictions and propose to their administrative and elected leaders that this new bill be supported. The goal is to gain enough support from Cities and Counties that the Association of Cities and Counties would adopt it as part of their 2011-2012 Legislative Agenda.

This proposed bill would be an option for local adoption (not mandatory) and would provide a process for decision making, appeals and abatements of solid waste without a warrant. The proposed law is framed closely to the States law on Junk Vehicles including the process elements such as notice and administrative appeals.

To have the most effect this legislative year, we are asking for decisions of support by August 31st and a letter of support from the Mayor or Commissioner or your jurisdiction.

**EVERETT CITY PLANNER SAVES CO-WORKER
FROM MASSIVE HEART ATTACK**

An Everett city planner is thanking a co-worker for saving his life.

Jim Hanson, 62, was playing ultimate Frisbee with a group of men on his lunch break in Garfield Park recently when he started suffering a heart attack.

"All the sudden I really felt short of breath," said Hanson. "I just kind of collapsed."

Other players ran to his aide. Gerry Ervine, also in the city planner's office, was among them.

"We turned Jim over and checked his pulse. He didn't have one," said Ervine.

Ervine and another player began performing CPR while someone called 911.

"I just remembered my training from the city about eight or ten years ago," said Ervine.

They kept Hanson alive for about four minutes until the ambulance arrived.

"I suddenly saw myself getting put into the aid car," Hanson remembered.

As it turns out, Hanson suffered a massive heart attack. One artery has 99 percent blockage. Paramedics say it's amazing he was kept alive the way he was.

"This is not your typical case," said Pete Vier, EMS Chief with the Everett Fire Department. "We are amazed at how proficient those two were with the CPR."

"I am so thankful to them," said Hanson, who had a stent put in his artery.

Jim now has plans to get certified in CPR. You can, too, by contacting your local Red Cross.

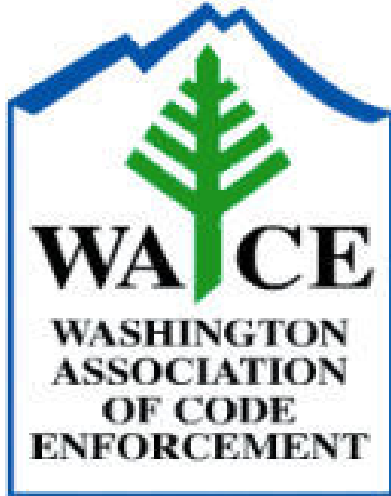

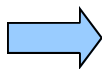
